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RESTORATION WORK STARTS AT LAST

After many delays and much frustration, work has finally started on the restoration and extension of West Lodge. This is expected to lead on to the construction of a new ornamental gateway entrance into Firbeck Hall. Apart from some remedial work to the roof and tree removal, this is the first positive action to take place since the Hall's days as a hospital and rehabilitation centre.

With regard to Firbeck Hall and the stable block, we are still hopeful of an early planning application in respect of the revised redevelopment scheme. This is expected to feature 8 substantial dwellings with the possibility of 2 further house conversions within the structure of the Hall itself. Alternatively, the Hall may be converted into an unspecified number of apartments.

SUNSHINE FAYRE

Letwell summer fayre proved a big success with early morning rain giving way to lots of glorious sunshine in the afternoon. Visitors to the annual show were as generous as ever with over £3,000 raised on the day for St. Peter's Church. See full report inside.

POTHOLE BATTLE GOES ON

Re-surfacing work on one of the main roads leading to our villages will take at least another two years or even more to complete depending on budget cuts.

Highway officials at Streetpride have told FLAG that they can't afford to renew the remaining heavily potholed section of Lamb Lane in one go as they would have wanted.

Instead, the work is being phased over two years with the next section - from Kidd Lane to Salt Hill - scheduled for next summer, and the most heavily damaged stretch from Salt Hill to the county boundary not being re-surfaced till the summer of 2016.

Both schemes, even then, could fall victim to future cuts in Rotherham's highway budget programme.

Figures provided by the council to a FLAG reader - who had written to the authority complaining about delays in completing the project - reveal that the work undertaken so far has cost the authority £250,000.

Re-surfacing the section from Leys Lane to Penny Hill, which was carried out in June 2010, cost $\pm 100,000$ alone. The council spent $\pm 80,000$ re-newing the road from Penny Hill to Ramper Road in May last year, and then another $\pm 70,000$ on the latest scheme in June - tarmacing the length from Ramper Road to Kidd Lane.

Streetpride's Stephen Finley says: "We want to re-surface Lamb Lane completely right to the county boundary, and we have done around two thirds of the road as things stand.

"We cannot afford to complete the work in one go, and the scheme is scheduled at the moment to be carried out over two years. However, everything is budget led, and we can't say what would happen if there were significant cuts next year."

Streetpride will continue to monitor the damaged section of highway on a regular basis. Mr Finley added: "One of our officers walks the road once a month, and we will deal with potholes on an ongoing basis."

The Annual Parish meetings were held on the 28th May with two extraordinary Parish Council meetings held on the 11th and 27th June.

Residents who attended the Annual meetings received reports from local organisations and the local church highlighting the events within the village over the last 12 months. The Chairman additionally delivered a report which advised of the work being undertaken by the Parish Council with the planting project, Christmas tree and current grants to the Church and Village Hall set to continue in 2014-15.

The members were pleased to note that the village telephone box had been repainted in June and is currently being used as a seed bank for residents.

Many residents attended an extraordinary meeting of the Council on the 27th June to provide their views on the latest planning application in respect of the Black Lion Public House. A decision is now awaited by the planning department regarding the redevelopment of the site. Members of the public and the Parish Council reiterated their hopes that the public house would continue to be successful and remain an important feature of the village.

The Parish Council were delighted to welcome Mr Marcus Fasey onto the Council. Mr Fasey was coopted onto the Parish Council at an extraordinary meeting on the 11th June. The Council still currently has one casual vacancy. DAVID WRIGHT DELIVERS THE LATEST EDITION OF HIS EVER POPULAR NATURE REPORT

"I mentioned in the previous edition of FLAG that Nuthatches had been in short supply over the winter. Well, I don't know where they've been, but they're back. Several people have stopped me to tell me about them, and I've seen them too. The Firbeck couple who've kept a garden record for many years tell me that one was in their garden on the final day of their winter recording season, thus ending the winter Nuthatch drought!

"Still no new species for me, but the elusive Red Kite has put in another appearance, this time at The Yews in April. I assume this is the same bird that's been gracing our local area in recent years? Mustbe! "And some excellent new about Cuckoos. A reliable source tells me one was calling in Firbeck on 27 April – confirmed a short time later by another reliable source. I've not heard a Cuckoo calling for three summers, so this is great news indeed. "A Cuckoo lays its single egg mainly in the nests of the Dunnock, Meadow Pipit, Pied Wagtail and Reed Warbler. In the last 40 years, Cuckoo numbers have dropped by 65%. The reason isn't known, but it's been suggested that declines in these host species, or climate-induced changes in the timing of their breeding, could have reduced the number of nests that are available for cuckoos to lay their eggs in. Other possible reasons for the decline include reduced prey (caterpillars) and deterioration of conditions along migration routes and over-wintering grounds in sub-Saharan Africa.

"Bullfinches continue to do well locally, and a Firbeck resident was delighted to see five of these beautiful birds on her roof in April.

"Yellow Wagtails returned to the Firbeck airfield site in late April, and are present at the time of writing. This builds on their presence last year, and more or less confirms they're breeding there – which is excellent. Skylarks also have a firm foothold there.

"I was very pleased to receive a report of a family of Goldcrests nesting in Firbeck. The Goldcrest and (much-rarer Firecrest) are the UK's smallest birds. They're very distinctive, sporting a bright black and yellow stripe on their heads. Beautiful little creatures."

LETWELL'S CORONATION MEADOW

Letwell churchyard has been designated as a People's Meadow under the Coronation Meadows project - which was dedicated by Prince Charles to the Queen to commemorate her Golden Jubilee in 2013.

A meadow rich in flowers and grasses was selected in each county, and these meadows will serve as seed donors to other recipient People's Meadows such as Letwell.

While the churchyard has a rich diversity of flora and fauna on the south side - including Star of Bethlehem, orchids and betony - the north side and areas where Winter Heliotrope have become dominant would benefit from re-seeding.

The designation confers no rights or obligations - but it is a recognition of the important status of the churchyard.

VALERIE'S BACK HOME

Popular long-time Firbeck resident Valerie Oxley was struck down five months ago by a rare and serious condition affecting the peripheral nervous system - which left her on a life support machine paralysed from the neck down.

Husband Mike is full of praise for the care Valerie has received at Rotherham General Hospital, and is now looking forward to his wife continuing her recovery back home.

Speaking to FLAG Mike said "I am delighted to say that Valerie has been discharged from Rotherham General Hospital after almost five months of treatment. Valerie is now convalescing at home in Firbeck and will be regaining her strength over the coming months.

"On St Valentine's Day - 14th February - Valerie was admitted to hospital with what was diagnosed as Guillain Barre Syndrome (GBS), which is a rare and serious condition of the peripheral nervous system. It occurs when the body's immune system attacks part of the nervous system.

"Valerie has had a very severe case of GBS and in less than a week from admission she was paralysed from the neck down and on a life support system in the Royal Hallamshire Hospital. To enable Valerie to breath she was given a tracheostomy and attached to a ventilator, which meant she was unable to speak for a month.

"Valerie was transferred back to Rotherham and has made her recovery by way of pneumonia and a deep vein thrombosis (not unusual with GBS). The recovery process involves a lot of physiotherapy as the peripheral nerves regrow and Valerie regains the use of her

limbs. "The care Valerie has received at Rotherham General Hospital has been excellent." On behalf of everyone FLAG wishes Valerie well in the weeks and months to come.

TAKE YOUR DOGGY-DOO HOME

RARE COIN FIND

FLAG's resident metal detecting sleuth Christina Warr has struck lucky again - uncovering a rare groat which dates all the way back to the time of Philip and Mary, who reigned between 1554 and 1558.

The find in a field at Letwell re-inforces evidence about habitation of the village going back almost six centuries.

Christina says: "A groat was worth four pennies, and one bearing Mary's head is quite rare, particulary as she was on the throne for such a short period so long ago.

"It's in good condition considering how long it's been beneath the ground. I'm quite proud of it - it just shows that people were living here way back in the 1500s. It does make you think about the history of Letwell..."
